

## **Archival Activities**

#### ARCHIVAL PROCESSING REPORT July 1, 1986-June 30, 1987

During the past year ICPSR has once again maintained its commitment to both its members and the larger social science community by providing a central repository for relevant machine-readable social science data and by processing and disseminating these data efficiently. The introduction to this report highlights the major data acquisition and processing activities performed by the Archive in 1986-1987; a complete list of data acquired and processed during the year follows this introduction. A more comprehensive and detailed view of ICPSR, its functions, and its holdings, can be found in the annual <u>Guide to Resources and Services 1987-1988</u> and in the four yearly issues of the <u>ICPSR Bulletin</u>. An additional resource, the telephone Hotline at 313/763-3486, keeps members informed of ICPSR's most recently released data collections.

#### Longitudinal Social and Political Data for the U.S.

During 1986-1987, several of ICPSR's major social and political collections were expanded through the addition of updates and new waves. One of the most important was the AMERICAN NATIONAL ELECTION STUDY, 1986, the nineteenth in a series of studies which examines the impact of American elections on voters and identifies the factors which influence their voting behavior. Several collections of ICPSR historical election returns were also updated after the 1985 elections: CANDIDATE AND CONSTITUENCY STATISTICS OF ELECTIONS IN THE UNITED STATES, 1788-1985; CANDIDATE NAME AND CONSTITUENCY TOTALS, 1788-1985; GENERAL ELECTION DATA FOR THE UNITED STATES, 1968-1985; and UNITED STATES HISTORICAL ELECTION RETURNS, 1788-1985. In addition, the activities of Congress were documented by UNITED STATES CONGRESSIONAL ROLL CALL VOTING RECORDS, 1789-1986 with the incorporation of the votes from the 99th Congress, Second Session, for both the Senate and the House of Representatives and the merging of these votes with those for the First Session. Two new data collections, ELECTORAL DATA FOR COUNTIES IN THE UNITED STATES: PRESIDENTIAL AND CONGRESSIONAL RACES, 1840-1972, and PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTEES, 1964-1984 (ICPSR 8458), were also prepared.

Social science inquiry was also enhanced this year by the GENERAL SOCIAL SURVEY CUMULATIVE FILE, 1972-1986 which probes respondents' attitudes across a broad spectrum of social issues such as the family, race relations, and education. ICPSR continues to distribute several other on-going collections which are used extensively by researchers studying American society; these include MONITORING THE FUTURE: A CONTINUING STUDY OF THE LIFESTYLES AND VALUES OF YOUTH, 1985 and the PANEL STUDY OF INCOME DYNAMICS, 1968-1984. In addition, NATIONAL LONGITUDINAL SURVEYS OF LABOR MARKET EXPERIENCE, 1966-1985 were augmented with updates for Youth, 1985 and Young Women, 1983.

#### International Data Collections

An important updated resource for researchers in the international arena is WORLD MILITARY EXPENDITURES AND ARMS TRANSFERS, 1973-1983 which documents military spending in 145 countries. Another collection on military issues is BEHAVIORAL CORRELATES OF WAR, 1816-1975 which documents the behavior of states involved in 38 inter-state crises over 160 years. In the on-going Euro-Barometer series, researchers can now use EURO-BAROMETER 22: ENERGY PROBLEMS AND THE ATLANTIC ALLIANCE, OCTOBER 1984; EURO-BAROMETER 23: THE EUROPEAN CURRENCY UNIT AND

WORKING CONDITIONS, APRIL 1985; and EURO-BAROMETER 24: ENTRY OF SPAIN AND PORTUGAL, OCTOBER 1985.

These newly released collections from four different countries examine various aspects of European and Canadian culture and politics: CAMBRIDGE STUDY IN DELINQUENT DEVELOPMENT [GREAT BRITAIN], 1961-1981; BRITISH CRIME SURVEY, 1982; NORWEGIAN LIFE HISTORY STUDY, 1971; SOVIET INTERVIEW PROJECT, 1979-1983; and CANADIAN NATIONAL ELECTION STUDY, 1984.

Several other collections combine data from several countries on topics of general international interest: WORLD DEBT TABLES, 1970-1985; VIOLENCE & CRIME IN CROSS-NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE, 1900-1972; and CLASS STRUCTURE AND CLASS CONSCIOUSNESS: MERGED MULTI-NATION FILE with data from five countries.

#### Media Polls

ICPSR continues to receive and release many polls conducted by the national news media. The CBS NEWS NATIONAL SURVEYS, 1985 contained an ongoing series of questions on social issues; the CBS NEWS/NEW YORK TIMES NATIONAL AND LOCAL SURVEYS, 1985 polled respondents on their opinions of the Reagan presidency; and the CBS NEWS/NEW YORK TIMES/TOKYO BROADCASTING SYSTEM COLLABORATIVE NATIONAL SURVEYS OF JAPAN AND THE UNITED STATES, 1985 contained interviews with citizens of both countries on topics such as trade, World War II, and politics.

#### Historical and Sociological Collections

ICPSR released several new collections of interest to historians and sociologists in 1986-87. In addition to the on-going social and political surveys mentioned in the first section above, several other collections are now available. The NATIONAL SURVEY OF BLACK AMERICANS, 1979-1980 is an important large-scale survey which examines the lives of Blacks in the United States from several perspectives; the NATIONAL SURVEY OF CHILDREN: WAVE I, 1976 AND WAVE II, 1981 examines the lifestyles of American children as they are affected by family and society; and the HIGHER EDUCATION GENERAL INFORMATION SURVEY (HEGIS), 1984: FINANCIAL STATISTICS provides statistics from over 3,000 colleges and universities on their funding and expenditures.

#### Data from the U.S. Census Bureau

A large number of data collections prepared by the U.S. Bureau of the Census were added in 1986-87 to ICPSR's already extensive holdings in this area. Waves III-IX were added to the SURVEY OF INCOME AND PROGRAM PARTICIPATION (SIPP), the major new Census Bureau collection which examines the economic well-being of American households and the relationship between economics and demography. ICPSR also obtained the CURRENT POPULATION SURVEY: ANNUAL DEMOGRAPHIC FILE, 1986 and the CENSUS OF POPULATION AND HOUSING, 1980 [UNITED STATES]: PUBLIC USE MICRODATA SAMPLE (D SAMPLE) [PUMS-D], a 1%% sample based on the 1980 long-form census questionnaire. ICPSR supplemented its series of collections in the field of economics with CONSUMER EXPENDITURE SURVEYS, 1982, 1983, and 1984: DIARY SURVEY and INTERVIEW SURVEY and with COUNTY BUSINESS PATTERNS, 1980 and 1984: U.S. SUMMARY, STATE, AND COUNTY DATA. Research on the functioning of American governmental units will be facilitated by the ANNUAL SURVEY OF GOVERNMENTS, 1985: EMPLOYMENT and FINANCE STATISTICS.

#### Externally Funded Projects

Although annual membership fees support most of the Archive's activities, external funding in the form of contracts and grants also serves to fund archival work in specialized areas. During the past twelve months, ICPSR received external grants from three agencies; these grants contributed in a significant way to the development of ICPSR resources.

For the tenth year, ICPSR received support for its National Archive of Computerized Data on Aging (NACDA) with funding from the National Institute on Aging. The NACDA Project focuses on the acquisition, processing, and maintenance of data collections concerned with aging and the life cycle. Several major collections were expanded in 1986-87. Data for 1981-1982 (Volume III) and 1983-1984 (Volume IV) were added to MORTALITY DETAIL FILES, 1968-1984, and data for 1940, 1950, and 1960 were added to UNITED STATES MICRODATA SAMPLES EXTRACT FILE, 1940-1980: DEMOGRAPHICS OF AGING. In addition, NACDA has expanded the HEALTH INTERVIEW SURVEYS for 1977-1984 and now distributes a CUMULATIVE CORE FILE, 1969-1981 as well, all of which are national-level evaluations of the nature and effectiveness of health care in this country. Researchers in the fields of sociology and medical care will be able to use the major national study HISPANIC HEALTH AND NUTRITION EXAMINATION SURVEY, 1982-1984.

Also completing its tenth year, the Criminal Justice Archive and Information Network (CJAIN), supported by the Bureau of Justice Statistics, continued to develop important data collections which concentrate on the area of crime and the criminal justice system. Data for four years were added to one of CJAIN's most important collections, the UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS, 1976-1984, which documents all crimes committed in the United States with facts about the crime, the victims, and the offenders. In addition, ICPSR released the NATIONAL CRIME SURVEYS: NATIONAL SAMPLE OF RAPE VICTIMS, 1973-1982, a new addition to a major continuing series. Major efforts were also made to document other aspects of the criminal justice system by the release of EXPENDITURE AND EMPLOYMENT DATA FOR THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM: LONGITUDINAL FILE, 1971-1979. In addition, ICPSR made available new data for two major on-going collections, JUVENILE DETENTION AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY CENSUS, 1984-1985 and CENSUS OF STATE ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES, 1984.

Finally, the National Endowment for the Humanities continued support for COST OF LIVING IN THE UNITED STATES, 1917-1919, a key historical study which contains economic data on more than 12,000 families who completed detailed questionnaires in 1919. In 1986-87 ICPSR completed this extensive survey by adding data from the remaining geographical regions of the country.

#### Overview for 1986-1987

The data collections discussed above reflect only a portion of the overall activities of the Archive during the past year. The section which follows presents a comprehensive listing of 1986-1987 acquisitions and processing and is arranged according to data Class. ICPSR handles four categories or Classes of data and Class is determined by the extent of Archive processing which a collection has undergone. Studies which have been extensively processed and have been organized into standard ICPSR format are categorized as Class 1 or II. Class III and IV collections have undergone minimal processing and are released basically in their original form.

During fiscal year 1986-1987, ICPSR acquired and processed 147 separate data collections containing a total of 726 discrete data files. Of these, 40 were Class I and Class II collections which contained 97 separate data files. There were 107 collections which had either Class III or Class IV designations composed of 629 discrete data files.

#### DATA FILES MADE AVAILABLE IN CLASS I FORM

Class I datasets have been checked, corrected if necessary, and formatted to ICPSR specifications. Also, the data may have been recoded and reorganized in consultation with the investigator to maximize their utilization and accessibility. A codebook, usually capable of being read by a computer, is available. This codebook fully documents the data and may include descriptive statistics such as frequencies or means. One copy of a printed codebook is supplied routinely to each Official Representative. All Class I studies are available on magnetic tape in either card-image or OSIRIS format.

The documentation exists as either a machine-readable codebook (which may be edited and updated as required by further processing), a multilithed draft version or a Xeroxed copy of the investigator's codebook. Any peculiarities in the data will be noted when the data are requested.

#### ICPSR DATA SERVICES PROVIDED

#### JULY 1, 1986 TO JUNE 30, 1987

The following pages list all requests for data and related services answered by the ICPSR archive for the fiscal year July 1, 1986 to June 30, 1987. Summary figures for the period are presented below.

Three hundred and three different institutions, organizations or individuals requested 19,549 datasets, totaling 3,781,315,560 card-images. The total for fiscal year 1985-1986 was 2,681,840,984 card-images. The increase in total data supplied by the Consortium between the two years was 41.0 percent. There has been a 117 percent increase in data distribution over the five-year period 1982-1983 and 1986-1987. ICPSR member institution requests for data represent over 99 percent of the total data provided.

Of the non-members requesting services, thirty-nine received SETUPS material under the distribution arrangement with the American Political Science Association. Non-member SETUPS card-images totaled 420,980. Fifty-five non-member individuals or organizations (including libraries and bookstores) received only textual materials in the form of photo-duplicated materials and codebooks at established prices. Eleven requestors received machine-readable data totaling about 20 million card-images at charges established for non-member services.

Non-members requesting data services from the archive pay an amount equal to the cost of generating the material, plus an added increment to compensate for academic and development costs borne by member institutions. In addition, individuals from non-member academic institutions hold the data "on loan" for a specified period of time, and individuals at non-academic institutions are restricted from any form of redissemination of the data.

#### FACTORS IN AGING: CONTINUED DEVELOPMENT OF RESEARCH RESOURCES

#### A Project Supported by the National Institute on Aging

The broad goals of the National Archive of Computerized Data on Aging (NACDA) are to encourage and facilitate research on aging, increase opportunities for research in the field, and contribute to improvement in the quality of that research. The NACDA project does so by providing (1) access to basic research data in readily-usable and well-documented form; (2) assistance and consultation in the use of data and requisite methodological and computational tools.

#### Development and Expansion of Archival Data Resources

Acquisition of basic research data and processing and documenting data collections to allow effective use constitute the central goal of the NACDA project, and the bulk of the funds requested in this proposal are allocated in pursuit of this goal. This work involves two sets of tasks. The first is the actual acquisition, processing and documenting of data identified as valuable for the purposes of secondary analysis. The second task, that of assessing research value and designing archival strategies for additional research areas in conjunction with specific research project staffs, becomes particularly challenging as the project continues to move into the biomedical area where secondary analysis is less common and the application of computer technologies for recording and analyzing data is less widespread.

The current NACDA data base will be maintained and expanded. A number of the data collections included, such as the Health Interview Survey, the Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, and the Current Population Survey Annual Demographic files are continuing in nature. We anticipate that as additional waves of data collection occur in these studies, the results will be added routinely to the archive.

A substantial number of epidemiological data collections have and will be added to the holdings. Data bearing upon special populations--e.g., minority groups and the "oldest of the old"--will be acquired, as will data bearing upon aging in a number of other nations. Similarly, data from several longitudinal data collection efforts, such as the Tecumseh Study and the Berkeley Growth and Guidance Studies, are targeted for acquisition. During the continuing project period, substantial attention will be devoted to identifying additional collections of longitudinal data reflecting the intrinsic importance of such studies to research on aging.

The list of data collections of value to the study of aging and suitable for archival acquisition and processing will substantially exceed available resources. Thus a major challenge facing the project staff and its advisory committees is one of selection and discrimination in terms of research value.

#### Improvement of Data Access and Use

The goal here is to better inform the research community of the availability of NACDA data and related resources and to facilitate utilization by providing improved means for identifying data suited to their specific research needs. This continuing goal will be pursued in part through presentations and exhibits at meetings of relevant professional associations. A related task will extend the NACDA program of publications and dissemination of the project newsletters and data directories. NACDA materials will be integrated into the automated reference tools developed by ICPSR and now being tested. The ICPSR has improved its

facilities for remote access to all its archival data holdings, providing a variety of easily used computer-based reference, search, and retrieval capabilities which will aid researchers in identifying data suited to their research goals. These efforts will, we expect, contribute to greater use of NACDA data holdings and also serve to attract researchers in other areas to the field of aging.

## EMPIRICAL RESEARCH TECHNIQUES FOR LATINO SCHOLARS IN THE BEHAVIORAL AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

## A Project Supported By The University of Texas And The Ford Foundation

The ICPSR and the Inter-University Program for Latino Research seeks support for a two year summer training program in social and behavioral science research techniques for Latino scholars from colleges and universities. In the proposed project we wish to develop a workshop/seminar setting over a period of four to eight weeks in which Latino scholars can obtain advanced training in techniques of social research, with an emphasis on data resources, data collection, and quantitative data analysis. Participants in the project would take part in an ongoing research seminar, "Latino Scholar Research Seminar," designed to facilitate these experiences. This continuing experience will be carried on within the context of the existing summer curriculum of courses in research design, measurement, data collection techniques, computer technology, and statistical analysis techniques. The existing menu of courses from the ICPSR Summer Training Program will provide the arena for research skill development and enhancement. We propose to utilize this existing structure of courses and the existing archive of social science data; (a) to provide a basis for the strengthening of research skills among Latino scholars, (b) to provide an interdisciplinary setting which exposes participants to state-of-the-art approaches to the application of research methods in the study of social science issues, (c) to provide access to information exchange and networks of available data resources and computer technology, and (d) to provide a setting for intellectual exchange on research issues pertinent to the interests of the participants.

Because of a variety of factors, minority scholars, especially Latinos have been relatively disadvantaged with regard to career development in the area of empirical research methods and techniques of analysis. Many such scholars are beyond the stage of formal educational training, and often lack the resources required to obtain exposure to the necessary skill areas on their own. Thus, we propose a program that will help rectify these disadvantages and which will develop an environment that provides more ready access to sources of skill acquisition in a relatively non-threatening, supportive setting in which others with similar backgrounds are participants. We propose to use our experience in training social scientists in research techniques, as well as the existing archive of data resources, including data from currently funded extramural research, to accomplish these objectives.

The Inter-university Program for Latino Research (IUP) was established in September, 1983 as a collaborative effort among four university research centers: Centro de Estudios Puertorriquenos, Hunter College, City University of New York; Center for Mexican American Studies, University of Texas at Austin; Chicano Studies Research Center, University of California, Los Angeles; and Stanford Center for Chicano Research, Stanford University. The program was initiated with support from the Carnegie Corporation, the Ford Foundation and the Tinker Foundation.

## STATE LEGISLATIVE ELECTORAL DATA: A RESEARCH RESOURCE FOR COMPARATIVE STATE POLITICS

#### A Project Supported by The National Science Foundation

This proposal is submitted on behalf of the community of scholars concerned with American state politics. Support is requested for development of a basic computer-readable data resource that will include complete returns for elections to both legislative houses in all fifty states, voter registration data, and, to the degree available, returns for legislative primary elections in the southern and border states for the years 1968 through 1986. The completed file will provide the full substantive and technical documentation required for effective research use including candidate names, party affiliations, incumbency status of candidates, location of districts and changes in district boundaries, and explanations of any missing data or other anomalies. These data will be complemented by and compatible in format with the computer-readable returns for federal and statewide elections as well as with extensive bodies of socioeconomic data already included in the data holdings of the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR). In this way it will be possible to link the state legislative returns directly to returns for elections to federal and other state offices and to socioeconomic data for purposes of analysis and comparison.

Returns for the large majority (approximately eighty percent) of the targeted state legislative elections during the period in question are already available in paper form at ICPSR. Approximately two-thirds of the relevant voter registration data have also been collected and are stored in paper form at ICPSR. Missing returns are now being collected and provided to ICPSR by scholars in the field. Returns for the 1986 elections will be obtained from state sources as soon as those returns become available. The data will be entered into computer-readable form, necessary error checking and correction procedures carried out, and computer-readable documentation prepared by ICPSR. All data will be generally available to the research community through the established data dissemination facilities and procedures of ICPSR.

Substantive assistance and guidance in the conduct of project work will be provided by a project steering committee. The committee members will assist the project staff in locating and obtaining returns for missing elections, reconciling variations in party names from one area of the nation to the other, identifying district boundaries, coping with boundary changes, designing the content of documentation, and in assuring that the organization and format of data meet the diverse research goals and interests of researchers.

To further stimulate research use and to encourage work addressing areas of central importance to substantive progress in the field, support is also requested for a research conference to be held approximately six months after completion of data entry and processing. The steering committee will commission research papers by leading experts which will employ the data to address problems of high priority for the development of the field. The data will be immediately available to all scholars whether or not they participate in the conference.

#### REPORT ON THE 1986 SUMMER TRAINING PROGRAM

The twenty-fourth annual ICPSR Summer Training Program in Quantitative Methods of Social Research was held in Ann Arbor from June 30 until August 22, 1986.

#### Program Organization, Attendance and Finances

The ICPSR Summer Program's instructional environment stresses integration of methods of quantitative analysis within a broader context of substantive social research, and instruction is coordinated with and reinforced by active participatory data analytic experiences on both mainframe and microcomputers. The Program has become nationally and internationally recognized as a primary mechanism for basic and advanced training in the methodologies and technologies of research and instruction in the social sciences. The attractions of the Program seems to be the range of methodological instruction provided; the opportunity for intensive study; and the quality of instruction and supporting facilities.

The direction of the content of the Program is guided by an Advisory Committee which is currently chaired by Herbert Weisberg (Ohio State University). Also Christopher Achen (University of Chicago) has joined the staff as an advisor to the Program.

As is usual the eight-week Program in 1986 was divided into two four-week sessions. In addition six short one-week intensive seminars were offered which overlapped the traditional eight-week Program. The total enrollment across the entire Program was 307. Average attendance in the Program from 1980 to 1985 was 310.

Participants represented twenty-four different departments and/or disciplines from 138 colleges and universities, and organizations in the U.S., Canada and a dozen other nations. While sociology (25 percent) and political science (21 percent) continue to be represented by the largest number of participants, the increasing number of individuals from across the social and behavioral sciences would appear to illustrate the breadth of interest in and impact of the Program.

Although most participants, including those designated visiting scholars, chose to audit courses, almost thirty percent enrolled in ICPSR courses for credit granted by The University of Michigan.

The Summer Program instructional staff numbered thirty individuals, of these 24 held faculty appointments at Consortium member institutions. The 1986 staff represented five different disciplines from twenty-two separate universities.

By virtue of the efforts of an increasing number of dedicated ICPSR Official Representatives, many participants received financial assistance for matriculation in the Summer Program. Participant support is primarily through direct grants, tuition subsidies provided by the student's home institution, extension of departmental fellowships, foundation grants, etc. Summary information on financial aid from sources other than ICPSR is, unfortunately, not available; however, there is reason to believe that such assistance far exceeds the \$35,000 in travel allocations distributed to participants by the Consortium.

In addition the ICPSR distributed financial assistance from several other sources. Thirteen research scholars were supported by a grant from the Bureau of Justice Statistics for participation in the workshop on Quantitative Analysis of Crime and Criminal Justice. The Bureau of Census subsidized twenty-one post-doctoral scholars to participate in a workshop on the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). In addition the University of Michigan provided stipends for minority participants; however, these grants were rendered only to University of Michigan graduate students. Finally, The University of Michigan's policy of granting visiting scholar status to post-doctoral scholars enabled more than one-third of the Program's participants to take Consortium courses and have full access to the University's facilities free of charge. Direct funding for the Summer Training Program--not including financial aid for participants-continues to be divided almost evenly between The University of Michigan and the Consortium.

#### **Program Course Offerings**

Over the last several years many changes have occurred in the ICPSR Summer Program. These changes have in some cases been evolutionary extensions of previous offerings, others have been creative innovations often at the cutting edge of empirical research. Indeed, those who have not followed the Program closely may be surprised by the substantial changes that have occurred. Change, however, has taken place without sacrificing attention to the basic statistical methods traditionally covered in the Program.

#### New Topics and Content

For the last few years the Program has offered instruction in LISREL Models with Unmeasured Variables which examines linear structural equation models with and without latent variables. Another recent change is the expansion of the Categorical Data Analysis workshop to include linear probability; linear discriminant, probit, and logit models; as well as contingency table analysis using linear probability, log-linear, and logistic models.

Two of the most exciting additions to the Program in the last two years deal with sample estimation and distribution problems. Robust Methods of Statistical Estimation introduces the recent creative uses of the Jackknife and the Bootstrap resampling procedures. Exploratory Data Analysis, and Nonparametric Statistics are also examined as aids to analyzing non-normally distributed data. A lecture series, Implications of Sample Design for Data Analysis, reviews various sampling methods with particular attention to the ways they affect secondary analysis of survey data. The use of weighting to adjust for unequal selection, to compensate for nonresponse, and to make sampling distributions conform to population distributions utilizing post-stratification is discussed and illustrated.

Three recent course additions address mathematical models. A lecture series, Modeling Social Phenomena, presents linear difference equations, dynamic modeling, and graph algebra. In addition there were workshops on Game Theory Modeling and Rational Choice Modeling.

Also the 1986 Program offered a workshop on Event History Analysis. This course presented recent developments in statistical techniques used for longitudinal analysis of categorical events such as crimes, wars, disease and behaviors in social-psychological experiments.

Finally, the Consortium has added two courses on advanced methods in demography. Methods of Population Estimation presented a number of extrapolation estimation techniques used for subnational estimation problems. Methods of Population Projection presented by Bureau of the Census analysts explained recent developments utilizing time series and economic, as well as demographic, techniques.

#### Intensive "Short" Courses

Over the last several years the Consortium has added to the schedule short, intensive workshops on selected topics aimed at those who cannot attend the Program for four or eight weeks. This past summer several such courses were presented. There were one-week (five day) workshops on LISREL Models, on categorical Log-linear Analysis, on Time Series Analysis, and on Contextual and Multilevel Effects Models.

In conjunction with the Bureau of the Census the Consortium sponsored a one-week seminar on the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). a recent and continuing data product of the Bureau. This data collection promises to be of great potential value to social and behavioral scientists. The survey consists of a rolling sample of 20,000 households per year which investigates individual and family income and financial resources, as well as participation in federal agency programs.

As has been the case for the last decade, the Program again featured a five-day workshop on Management of Machine-Readable Files. This course is offered every other year.

#### Substantively Oriented Courses

Complementing the methods curriculum of the Program there is a set of courses that are substantively oriented. The instructional focus is on applying quantitative methods of analysis to particular substantive areas rather than on learning new statistical and mathematical techniques. These courses include Quantitative Analysis of Crime and Criminal Justice; Quantitative Historical Analysis; and American Electoral Research: Use of the American National Election Studies for Replication and Elaboration.

#### **Applied Statistics and Mathematics**

The curriculum of the Program continues to include a wide variety of courses in the core areas of statistics and mathematics as applied to the social and behavioral sciences. The eightweek Introduction to Statistics sequence remains a popular component. Enrollment is composed of individuals beginning their methodological training as well as scholars who are attempting to "retool" their research skills.

The several Linear Models courses continue to be the single most heavily enrolled set of workshops. It is evident that the previous training of most participants has prepared them to best take advantage of material focusing upon least squares, regression, and structural equation models. Hence, the emphasis in the Program as well is upon courses in Causal Modeling, Time Series and LISREL.

The Program over the last several years has added a set of workshops geared to areas other than linear models. These include Categorical Analysis, Multivariate Statistical Analysis (covering such topics as Principle Component, Discriminant, and Factor Analysis, and Canonical Correlation), Scaling and Dimensional Analysis, and Measurement and Design of Social Research. In addition, a set of courses reviews such mathematical topics as algebra, set theory, matrix algebra, probability, and calculus.

#### COMPUTER SUPPORT ACTIVITIES

The Computer Support Group is responsible for assessing ICPSR computing needs and evaluating, developing or acquiring, and maintaining computing equipment and programs used internally by the ICPSR servicing, archival, and administrative operations. Several major programming projects have been under taken by the Computer Support Group over the years to provide the ICPSR with more effective data processing tools. Increasing use of available software from both commercial and academic sources is now the rule. In the hardware area, ICPSR remains committed to the concept of increasingly powerful individual work stations electronically networked to larger processors which facilitate the sharing of databases and expensive peripheral devices.

#### **ICPSR Computing Hardware**

The ICPSR continues to make extensive use of an in-house computing system consisting of a large Prime Computer, Inc. minicomputer and over eighty Zenith microcomputer work stations. An X.25 network gateway connects the larger minicomputer to the University of Michigan's backbone campus network and from there to the national and international telecommunications system. Thus each workstation can work stand-alone, on the ICPSR's Prime, or on any computer that can connect to the University's campus network.

The ICPSR has upgraded its existing computing resources by replacing two smaller minicomputers with a single Prime 9955 processor. The new machinery has operated smoothly and has provided ICPSR with the additional computing power needed to handle the increased load in the archiving and servicing areas as well as leaving extra performance for anticipated growth.

#### **Microcomputers**

ICPSR staff have been monitoring the potential applications of microcomputers since they first emerged as hobbyist machines in the last half of the 1970s. These units and the software developed for them have now reached the point where they are an essential part of both ICPSR's working environment and the working environment of many scholars and data archivists at ICPSR member institutions. Careful evaluation of the best of the available systems has been an on-going activity.

Reports on this experience will be summarized periodically in the quarterly <u>ICPSR Bulletin</u>. These same experiences provide the foundation for a series of intensive presentations on microcomputer applications offered in the ICPSR Summer Program. The focus in both presentations will be on the hardware and software available for document preparation and production, data analysis, numeric and textual data base management, spreadsheets, graphics, terminal emulation and telecommunications.

#### Networking

For over ten years the Computer Support Group has assisted scholars who wished to use the University of Michigan's main academic computing facility via one of the public data network services: Telenet, Tymnet, or Autonet (all registered service marks). This required that the remote user be familiar with the Michigan Terminal System (MTS) operating system to take advantage of the many computing resources available.

An exciting new project is the Consortium Data Network (CDNet) which went into production use in the Spring of 1986. This facility allows Official Representatives from ICPSR member institutions easy, efficient access to ICPSR resources. Two key services provided are an on-line searchable version of the holdings section of the ICPSR Guide to Resources and Services and a computer aided, interactive data ordering facility, CDNet Order. The ordering facility generates the appropriate prompts based on a database of information about both the complexities of the data being order and the characteristics on file about the ordering institution. Also available through CDNet are access to SPSS-X and OSIRIS IV for statistical analysis of all the ICPSR data holdings and access to CONFER, an electronic conferencing system. ICPSR Official Representatives have all been sent the necessary computer accounts to use the CDNet order facility which they may use without charge. Both ORs and other scholars may set up the necessary accounting to use the on-line databases, the statistical analysis software and the conferencing system all of which do have charges associated with their use.

CDNet uses existing public data networks (Telenet, Tymnet, and Autonet) which allow interactive computing sessions from virtually all locations where the ICPSR has member institutions. A special interface was written by the Computer Support Group. This interface relieves the remote user from the need to know about the idiosyncrasies of the local machine environment by providing a straightforward menu driven set of tasks and an on-line help and documentation feature. The interface also handles security for ICPSR data tapes and the switching between the ICPSR's Prime and the University of Michigan's mainframe computer where some of the services provided by CDNet are actually executed. In fact, CDNet gives ICPSR the flexibility to add or move functions from machine to machine as is appropriate given cost and service considerations.

On the technical front, future plans include: improvements in the network interface to enhance speed and the number of networks to which CDNet can connect, access to additional statistical packages, and specifications for an Official Representative workstation that will facilitate local archival maintenance and remote up and downloading of information from CDNet. Of particular interest in this area is the University of Michigan's efforts to implement the Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol: a very sophisticated suite of network software and hardware that will allow very high speed messaging, file transfer, remote interactive sessions and interprocess communications. These protocols, originally developed by the Defense Department Advanced Research and Planning Agency, will be the backbone of several emerging communications networks including NSFNet, a proposed network connecting scholars doing National Science Foundation related research.

#### **Current Software Products**

The Computer Support Group continues to provide several software products of interest to the membership. The ABC statistical package remains one of the best offerings for simple classroom use where the focus is on substantive issues and where the instructor does not wish to expend time teaching technical details of computer use. The prompting structure, good error handling and on-line help and documentation facility make ABC an excellent choice for the new or infrequent user of statistical packages. A companion ABCEntry package assists in the data preparation and entry phases. Alternatively, ABC will read raw ASCII data and optionally will pickup the necessary labelling, missing data and location information from SPSS control cards and/or OSIRIS dictionary. The package runs on most PC-DOS and MS-DOS computers (IBM PCs and most similar microcomputers). There are also versions for the DEC VAX under VMS and Prime minicomputers running the Primos operating system.

Also available, is a spreadsheet system called QuickPlan. This brings the power of the Lotus 1-2-3 type software to the minicomputer environment. QuickPlan is available for the Prime minicomputer family running the Primos operating system.

For several years now, the ICPSR has used a data entry and screening package called Devil. This microcomputer based package was developed internally by the Computer Support Group. The main application to date has been the entry of a very large database collected for the "Family Life and Conditions in the United States" project and its successors. These data are characterized by the mixture of numeric and varying length text fields, the need for footnotes to explain the contents of many of the fields and the large variance that must be allowed for in coding the various sized families and their food and clothing expenses. Devil will also be used to move the entry of U.S. Roll Call data and U.S. Election Return data to microcomputers to lower the cost of these tasks. Future plans include investigation of the use of Devil to facilitate the entry of data documentation on microcomputers. This information would then be uploaded to the Prime minicomputer prior to final archival processing using the GIDO data preparation and documentation software. This two step process will off-load tasks from the Prime and allow computing intensive tasks to be scheduled for low use periods in the evenings and over weekends.

# Financial Summary

Expenditures: 1986-1987

Total Consortium income for 1986-1987 amounted to \$2,610,203 as compared to \$2.34 million in 1985-1986. Of 1986-1987 income, approximately \$1,246,160 (forty-eight percent of total income) was derived from member fees. Slightly more than \$1,011,000 (thirty-nine percent of total income) was derived from grants and contracts. The University of Michigan provided \$208,598 (eight percent of the total), and income from miscellaneous sources including cost reimbursement for loan of data to non-members, documentation costs, summer program fees and interest on funds on hand amounted to \$144,404 (or approximately five percent of the total). Taken in combination, income from sources other than member fees amounted to fifty-two percent of total income.

Income and expenditures are summarized in greater detail in the three displays that follow. The first of these summarizes expenditures in terms of twelve categories which constitute functional areas of Consortium activities. These categories are in turn grouped into three broader categories of activity. Expenditures in the first of these categories, Resource Development and Services, constitute the largest component of the total budgets and support acquisition, development, documentation and dissemination of data and related services and resources. Within this category, the largest expenditures are for development of archival resources which also constitutes the largest single component of the budget totals. Expenditures in the second major category, Educational Activities, are largely in support of the annual Summer Training Program. Governance and Member Relations, the third major category, includes expenditures for general administration, communications and publication of informational materials, and periodic meetings of the Council, Official Representatives and advisory committees. For each major expenditure category, the sources of income are also given.

The second display below gives the balance of actual income and expenditures. As can be seen, 1986-1987 income exceeded expenditures by approximately \$48,700. That amount added to the carry forward from preceeding years left the Consortium with a net positive balance of approximately \$98,550.

The final display below summarizes Consortium income by sources.
