THE 1974-1979-1980 CANADIAN NATIONAL ELECTIONS AND QUEBEC REFERENDUM PANEL STUDY (ICPSR 8079)

This study is a continuation of the 1974 Canadian Election Study which consisted of extensive personal interviews with a national sample of 2,562 respondents following the federal election of July 8, 1974. Immediately following the federal election of May 22, 1979, 1,295 of the original respondents were successfully contacted and interviewed, thereby creating a 1974-1979 panel study. In addition, a new national sample of the 1979 electorate and a supplementary sample of young voters (age 18-23) were drawn and personal interviews utilizing the same questionnaire were conducted with respondents in these samples. After the federal election of February 18, 1980, 1,748 respondents in both the panel and cross-section samples were contacted by telephone and reinterviewed. No new respondents were added to the 1980 sample. When the Quebec referendum was called for May 20, 1980, a decision was made to again contact by telephone Quebec respondents original sampled in 1974 or 1979 and interviewed in 1980. 325 of these respondents were successfully contacted and reinterviewed; approximately half of the interviews were conducted immediately prior to the referendum, and the remaining half immediately afterward.

The 1974 post election survey covered a wide range of areas involving citizen participation in politics. The 1979 survey continued the theme of citizen interest and involvement in politics and probed into respondents attitudes about regions, provinces, and national unity. The 1980 telephone interview asked about vote choice in 1980, party identification, and also brought up the issue of energy. The Quebec referendum centered around the respondents' views on constitutional options for Quebec.

The study is available in card-image and logical record length format. An OSIRIS dataset can be supplied. Processing of this study to its present form was carried out at the University of Windsor under the supervision of Kai Hildebrandt. Class II

NATIONAL SURVEY OF ADOLESCENT FEMALE SEXUAL BEHAVIOR, 1976 (ICPSR 8043)

This study was designed to gather information concerning the sexual experiences of young women. Data were collected through personal interviews with a national sample of adolescent females.

Information was collected concerning respondents' attitudes toward premarital sex, knowledge and use of contraceptives, and past or current pregnancies, if any. Respondents were also queried regarding their future educational and career plans. Demographic items include detailed information on the origin of the respondents' family.

The file contains 2,193 records and has a logical record length of 760 characters. Documentation includes column locations, code descriptions, and questionnaires. Class IV.

HISTORICAL SUPPLEMENT TO THE DEMOGRAPHIC YEARBOOK, 1948-1978 (ICPSR 7892)

These files were prepared as supplements to the Demographic Yearbook, 1980 and contain time series on population size, age, sex, urban-rural residence, natality, mortality, and nuptiality, as well as selected derived measures concerning these components of population change for a 30-year time period. The unit of analysis is ethnic group within country, by year. File 1 has 15,000 records, file 2 has 22,000 records and file 3 has 1,300 records. All three files are available only in logical record format. Class III

YEARBOOK OF WORLD ENERGY STATISTICS, MASTER FILE, 1970-1979 (ICPSR 7893)

This dataset, collected by the United Nations, includes information on two hundred countries and their levels of production and trade of various energy commodities over a ten year period. In this file, each record refers to an individual reporting country and the annual quantities of production and trade of each of its commodities. When a transaction of trade is involved, the record refers to total trade for that country, excluding reference to countries of origin or destination. Each record is uniquely identified by reporting country, transaction, commodity and period code. There are 115,000 records, available in logical record format. Class III

United Nations;

COMMODITY PRODUCTION STATISTICS, 1958-1979 (ICPSR 7894)

The United Nations collected information from individual countries regarding their commodity production and created this dataset. For each country, year, and commodity, statistics are given on the quantity produced. This is the Master file of input to the Yearbook of Industrial Production, Vol. II. There are 288,000 records in logical record format for the file including the years 1958-1973 and 301,000 records for the file encompassing 1965-1979. Class III

GENERAL INDUSTRIAL STATISTICS, 1953-1979 (ICPSR 7950)

There are statistics on production for industries engaged in mining, manufacture, production, and distribution of electricity, gas, and water in this dataset created by the United Nations. Information was collected from individual countries regarding their industrial production. These files correspond to the Yearbook of Industrial Statistics, Volume I. File 1 has 143,000 records for 1953-1967, and file 2 has 406,000 records for 1967-1979. Class III

CBS News/The New York Times;

CBS NEWS/THE NEW YORK TIMES NATIONAL SURVEYS, 1981 (ICPSR 7991)

The datasets described below are part of an ongoing data collection effort in which The New York Times and CBS News are equal partners. The common denominator in the surveys is a continuing evaluation of the public response to the Reagan presidency. However, each data collection also includes questions that address broader social issues, such as childrearing or victimization. These national surveys are administered by telephone to a respondent selected from eligible household members. Each file has an LRECL of 240 with one record per respondent.

Part 1: January 1981. 1,512 respondents were asked for their views on how Reagan was likely to perform as President in economic and foreign affairs. Respondents were also asked for their views on the federal budget, including their opinions on which programs should have their funding increased or decreased. Questions about the release of the hostages from Iran, busing, and school integration were also included. Class III

Part 2: April 1981. 1,439 respondents were asked how Reagan had performed thus far in economic and foreign affairs, and how he was likely to perform in the future. There were also questions about the tax cut, the federal budget, women's rights, El Salvador, Poland, handguns, and Japanese cars. Class III

Part 3: June 1981. 1,433 respondents were asked to evaluate Reagan's performance as President. They were also questioned about their general life satisfaction, their confidence in government institutions, and their views on crime and social security revisions. Questions on various topical issues in foreign affairs, such as military rule in Poland, were also asked. Class III

Part 4: June 1981, Social Security. 1,467 respondents gave their views on the social security system and proposed changes to it. Respondents were also queried for their views on childrearing, how juvenile crime should be punished, and who should receive custody of children in divorce situations. Class III

Part 5: September 1981. 1,479 respondents evaluated Reagan's performance in economic and foreign affairs. They also gave their views on environmental issues and on various economic proposals, including the tax cut. Class III

CENSUS OF POPULATION AND HOUSING, 1980 [UNITED STATES]: SUMMARY TAPE FILE 1C (ICPSR 8091)

Summary Tape File 1 consists of four sets of computer-readable data files containing detailed tabulations of the nation's population and housing characteristics produced from the 1980 Census.

All three groups of files within the STF1 series have identical record formats and technical characteristics and differ only in the types of geographical areas for which the summarized data items are presented. COUNTY-LEVEL ESTIMATES OF THE POPULATION AGED 60 YEARS AND OVER BY AGE, SEX, AND RACE, 1977-1980 (ICPSR 7955)

Preparation of this dataset was funded by grant #90-A-1279 from the Administration on Aging. Estimates of the population of the aged were received from the Bureau of the Census in printed form and were made machine readable by the staff of ICPSR. Other variables contained in this dataset were merged from existing machine-readable census files. The data concerning racial composition of counties were taken from the CENSUS OF POPULATION AND HOUSING, 1980 [UNITED STATES]: P.L. 94-171 POPULATION COUNTS (ICPSR 7854). The figures concerning per capita income were taken from the Bureau of the Census, GENERAL REVENUE SHARING, 1978 POPULATION ESTIMATES (ICPSR 7840). Class I.

Summary Tape File 1 consists of four sets of computer-readable data files containing detailed tabulations of the nation's population and housing characteristics produced from the 1980 Census. This series is comprised of Summary Tape File 1A (STF1A), Summary Tape File 1B (STF1B), Summary Tape File 1C (STF1C), and Summary Tape File 1D (STF1D). STF1A, STF1B, and STF1D have 52 separate files, one for each state, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia. STF1C consists of one nation-wide datafile containing information about all states. All files in the STF1 series are identical, containing 321 substantive data variables organized in the form of 59 "tables," as well as standard geographic identification variables. All of the data items contained in all the STF 1 files were tabulated from the "complete count" or "100%"

questions included on the 1980 Census questionnaire.

All four groups of files within the STF1 series have identical record formats and technical characteristics and differ only in the types of geographical areas for which the summarized data items are presented. STF1D provides summaries for state or state equivalent; Congressional District (as constituted for the 98th Congress); county or county equivalent; places of 10,000 or more people; and minor civil division/census county division (MCD/CCD).

All STF1 files are being released on state-by-state "flow" basis, with the less populous states generally being prepared and released before the most populous states.

Each "record" in these files comprises 3,276 characters with two record segments (physical records) of 1,638 characters each; the number of data records in each file varies by state. Class IV

**AMERICAN NATIONAL ELECTION STUDY, 1980:
PRE AND POST ELECTION SURVEYS (ICPSR 7763)**

The second edition of the Pre and Post Election Surveys, the traditional time series component of the American National Election Study, is now released. This second release contains, in addition to the survey and vote validation variables included in the first release, 225 contextual variables, including historical and 1980 election returns, Federal Election Commission data on campaign financing for congressional candidates, and ratings of incumbent congressmen by various interest groups. These variables have been merged with the survey data to yield a single file of 1433 variables for 1614 respondents.

This release also includes a substantial reworking of the education and occupation sections, with the result that the variables have been significantly renumbered. The published codebook which documents this second edition, and which members have recently received, should not and can not be used with the original version of the data.

The dataset is available in card-image and OSIRIS formats. This second release is the version described in the ICPSR GUIDE TO RESOURCES AND SERVICES, 1982-1983. The second release of the panel component of the American National Election Study, 1980, the Major Panel File, is expected to be ready for release in December. Class I

**Mendelsohn, Harold and Garrett J. O'Keefe;
MEDIA CRIME PREVENTION CAMPAIGN IN THE
UNITED STATES, 1980 (ICPSR 8050)**

The Crime Prevention Survey was collected as part of an ambitious project to evaluate the effects of programs intended to encourage crime prevention among the public. It was designed by Drs. Harold Mendelsohn and Garrett O'Keefe, both of the Center for Mass Communications Research and Policy at the University of Denver. The data were collected by the Roper Organization by personal interviews with 1,502 persons in April 1980. This survey focused on the respondents' reports of their media use, their perceptions about crime and its nature, and the number and nature of neighborhood contacts they had. Its original intent was to evaluate the impact of a national crime prevention campaign which was in progress in 1980. There are 352 variables in the data. This data collection was originally released as a Class IV and has now been revised as Class II.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTS, 1966-1980 (ICPSR
7676)**

The Uniform Crime Reports data are drawn from the monthly reports of crimes known, cleared and arrests submitted by law enforcement agencies. Previously available only for the years 1967 to 1976, the archive is now receiving these data directly from the FBI. The data now covers the year 1980 and contains reports from approximately 16,000 agencies. Additional years will be released soon. Class II

**UNITED NATIONS ROLL CALL DATA, 1946-1981
(ICPSR 5512)**

General Assembly roll calls for the First to the Twenty-ninth Plenary Sessions (1946-1979), the Thirty-third to the Thirty-sixth Plenary Sessions (1978-1981), the First to the Fifth Special Sessions, and for the seven committees are available in this dataset. All of the data are stored in member format. That is, the U.N. member is the case, the roll call is the variable, and the member's vote is the value for each variable. The machine-readable documentation contains a synopsis of each roll call including the total vote on that roll call and its location in the General Assembly Official Records. (Codebooks for sessions 21-29 and 33-36 are available only on tape.) Class I

**U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency;
WORLD MILITARY EXPENDITURES AND ARMS
TRANSFERS, 1969-1978 (ICPSR 7964)**

This data collection was announced in the April Bulletin and listed in the GUIDE as a Class IV study. It has been updated and revised and is now Class I. The two parts to this study are essentially two different means of organizing the same data. File one, organized by country records, has 145 records and 354 variables with a logical record length of 1,702. File two, organized by country/year records, has 45 variables, 1,450 cases, and a logical record length of 346.

The correct name for ICPSR #7767, Edward E. Azar, is CONFLICT AND PEACE DATA BANK (COPDAB), 1948-1978: DAILY EVENTS FILE (not DAILY AGGREGATIONS).

There are several major errors in the 1980 Census data files as provided to ICPSR by the Bureau of the Census.

1. STF 1B : Table 44 (containing only 1 data variable: "Median Contract Rent") was miscalculated in the data file. The Census Bureau is not going to re-release the data files but has provided User Note 2 to STF 1 Technical Documentation, providing the calculational formula for this median. This User Note has been incorporated into the ICPSR version of the documentation or can be supplied separately if requested.

2. STF 2B : Tables B31-B36 all contain incorrect data in every state file ("Tenure, Occupancy, Plumbing Facilities, etc. for households with elderly householders"). The Bureau will probably NOT re-release the STF 2B data files, but most likely will issue Errata for these Tables. In the meantime, these data tables should NOT be used.

3. STF 3A : An error in Table 141 for the first three states released (Connecticut, Rhode Island and Montana) has been corrected by the Bureau and these files have been re-released. ICPSR has acquired all three files and they are available for use.

Other Errata for 1980 Census Summary Tape Files

1. STF 1- Three User Notes describing errors discovered to date have been issued by the Bureau and incorporated into the ICPSR version of the documentation for these files. Users who received these data files from ICPSR should check the codebook provided; separate copies of any of the three User Notes can be provided upon request.

2. STF 2- Two User Notes for the STF 2 data files have been issued by the Bureau. Check the ICPSR version of the codebook for these notes.

3. STF 3- One User Note has already been issued by the Bureau for STF 3. It also has been incorporated into the ICPSR version of the codebook for these files.

DETROIT AREA STUDY, 1976: A STUDY OF METROPOLITAN AND NEIGHBORHOOD PROBLEMS (ICPSR 7906) has 377 variables, not 374 and the logical record length is 489 not 482.

DETROIT AREA STUDY, 1973: A STUDY OF THE CIVIL MILITARY INTERFACE AND THE APPLICATION OF LABORATORY METHODOLOGIES IN A SURVEY SETTING (ICPSR 7907) has 644 variables, not 667 and the logical record length is 920 not 990.

DETROIT AREA STUDY, 1975: A STUDY OF COMMUNITY LIFE AND POLITICS (ICPSR 7908) has 515 variables not 512 and the logical record length is 752 not 744.
