Best Practice for Sharing Code using NACDA-OAR (self-publishing repository)

- Remove identifying information from the data to protect confidentiality. NACDA and ICPSR do not review self-published submissions for disclosure risk.
- If applicable, request permission to share any secondary data you used by emailing icpsr-belp@umich.edu before you publish your project. Please refer to the ICPSR Redistribution Policy prior to contacting us.
- What should my deposit/project include?
 - Syntax/code
 - We recommend that data users share the code/syntax they have prepared throughout the course of their projects.
 - The code should specifically note the study DOI(s); ICPSR DOIs contain the version number of the primary dataset.
 - Where multiple datasets were used, the study numbers, dataset names and numbers should be noted clearly.
 - Your code should have all the steps you used when manipulating the data so that other users can replicate the results, including computed variables, sorting, etc.
 - Write comments in your code to best aid secondary users.
 - Run your code in a clean environment to ensure the package is reproducible.

Documentation

- o Describe the manipulations you performed on the secondary data and the purpose.
- Almost any file format is acceptable, but try to use file formats which allow other data users to best review the materials, such as PDF.

Metadata

- Create a unique and descriptive title for your project; in terms of discovery, it helps data users to include the years and geography in the title.
- Use subject terms to tag your project and identify topics that your project reflects.
- Provide complete information for all relevant and applicable fields in the project space.
- Clear reference (DOI) to data source, including version number
- Any publications related to your project and the analysis you performed
- Refer to <u>NACDA Data Sharing Best Practices</u> for details about file-naming, metadata at the collection
 and variable level, and more; these best practices pertain to data sharing in general, whether it is to our
 curated NACDA archive or the NACDA-OAR self-publishing option.
- After you upload your materials to the <u>NACDA-OAR</u> and select "publish", any person searching the NACDA or ICPSR websites will have the opportunity to discover your project!
